Luke 23:26-38

We are accustomed to finding a catch in every promise, but Jesus' stories of extravagant grace include no catch, no loophole disqualifying us from God's love. How different these stories are from my childhood notions about God: a God who forgives, yes, but

my son was dead, and is alive again; he was lost, and is found!" What blocks forgiveness is not God's reticence—"But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion for him" —but ours. Read Matthew 6:14-15; Luke 6:35-36; & Ephesians 4:32. Does God ask us to forgive people who hurt us, even if they aren't repentant? Explain.

The gospel is not at all what we would come up with on our own. I for one, would expect to honor the virtuous over the deprayed. I would expect to have to clean up my act before even applying for an audience with a Holy God. But Jesus told of God ignoring a fancy religious teacher and turning instead to an ordinary sinner who pleads, "God, have mercy." Throughout the Bible, in fact, God shows a marked preference for "real" people over "good" people. In Jesus' own words, "There will be more rejoicing in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who do not need to repent." In one of his last acts before death, Jesus forgave a thief dangling on a cross. That thief would never study the Bible, never attend synagogue or church, and never make amends to all those he had wronged. He simply said "Jesus, remember me," and Jesus promised, "Today you will be with me in paradise." It was another shocking reminder that grace does not depend on what we have done for God but rather what God has done for us. Ask people what they must do to get to heaven and most reply, "Be good." Jesus stories contradict that answer. All we must do is cry, "Help!" God welcomes home anyone who calls on Him, and, in fact, has made the first move already. Jesus came for the sick and not the well, for the unrighteous and not the righteous. To his banquet table he welcomed tax collectors and reprobates and whores. And to those who betrayed him—especially the disciples, who forsook him at his time of greatest need—he responded like a lovesick father.—Philip Yancey, What's So Amazing About Grace?

## MY RESPONSE:
